### Board-Led Committees - Leadership in Action

Our Leadership in Action™ (LiA) program began in 2017 and is led through an auxiliary committee headed by LNC Board of Education member Anna Blackwelder and LNC HS principal Craig Smith. Leadership has alw ays been a foundational pillar at LNC and prior to LiA, had taken place organically across the grade levels. How ever, as LNC grew we recognized that it was time for a more formal approach, K-12. After exploring and examining best practices at public, charter and private schools across the country, as well as focus groups of teachers and parents, LiA was born. LiA plays out differently across the three schools, thoughtfully delivering content in age-appropriate ways across the grade levels. The goal of understanding and experiencing LiA's seven key leadership skills and concepts, however, is consistent throughout the K-12 journey. The seven skills are Communication and Collaboration; Integrity and Personal Accountability; Confidence; Enthusiasm and Purpose; Adaptability and Creativity; Empathy, Humility and Compassion; Problem Solving and Critical Thinking.

At the ES, the counselor, Mrs. Crane, purposefully introduces each of the skills in an age-appropriate way over the course of the students' journey from kindergarten through 4th grade. This includes using books, videos and activities that illustrate a particular leadership skill in child-friendly terms and hosting intentional group dialog to further explain the concept and relate it to our elementary students' lives.

At the MS, the students discuss and work with all seven skills each year with a different focus in each grade. In 5th grade, the characteristics are defined and in 6th grade, the skills are applied through the 6th grade community service project. In 7th grade, the students self-assess how they are personally living each of the seven skills and identify opportunities for grow th. In 8th grade, the students think and write about how they will project these skills moving forward into their high school years and beyond. This instruction is delivered by the students' teachers and overseen by counselors Ms. Bish and Ms. Kaproth-Glenn.

The HS portion of LiA takes place over the course of the students' freshman, sophomore and junior years. During these three years, students delve into the leadership skills using specified time during the school day throughout the school year to meet with their LiA adviser and to collaborate with their cohort of peers. This adviser and cohort remain the same throughout high school, giving students time to build relationships with their adviser and leadership peers. Students study and discuss each skill in depth, focusing on only two or three per year. They have intermittent workshops during which the students reflect on how they have demonstrated the skill through a written narrative. At the conclusion of their junior year, each student should have a portfolio demonstrating their individual understanding of each skill and detailing how they have applied it. The portfolio is beneficial in many ways, including helping spark or supplement ideas for college application essays or job interviews. LNC is very excited to teach our students these invaluable life skills that, along with LNC's Service component, enable our students to be more independent as they go out into the world.


Did you know that LNC's ratio of school counselors to students is among the low est in our area? This allows our six counselors


### **Emergency Evacuation Procedures**


## Do You Know Your Child's Student ID Number?

A child's student ID number is a unique number given to your child by the state of NC when they begin school. If your student did not come from an NC public school, LNC would have assigned a number to the student when they began school at LNC. This unique student ID number will follow your child until they graduate from HS. Why is it important for me to know my child's student ID number? As this is a unique number for each student, this is an easy way for us to track payments for fieldtrips and technology co-pays, the Parent Handbook and Student Expectation forms and more. Students also use their student ID number to sign into any school technology. How do I find my child's student ID number? The easiest and fastest way is to ask your student! You can also find this number on their report card and/or EOG testing results. Please write down this number and keep it handy. LNC will be asking parents for the student ID number more frequently. ### **Student Absences**

An absence is defined as missing half of any class period or more. For every absence, students must bring a note from home stating the student's name, date(s) of absence, reason for absence, and parent/guardian signature. Notes for ES students may be emailed or given to the child's teacher and the front office. At the

evacuated. Additional information about LNC's procedures in case of evacuation are available in Schoology LNC2HSP, LNC2MSP and LNC2ESP, (Resources, Forms and Information).

MS, these notes are to be given to the student's first period teacher during the morning. HS students should deliver these notes to the main office before school. It will be the responsibility of the administration to determine if the absence is excused or unexcused. Students must bring in a note or have an e-mail sent by their parent/guardian for their absence to be considered excused.

### **Student Early Dismissal**

Students will be permitted to leave campus early only with parental consent. Parents must sign students out in the main office and no student will be released directly from the classroom for any reason. In no case will a student be allowed to leave school with anyone except his/her parent or guardian unless the school has an e-mail or note signed by the student's parent/guardian. If the early dismissal is for a medical appointment, the student should bring a note from the medical professional to the office the next day for the absence to be considered excused. HS students who drive themselves to school must bring a note signed by the parent, including a contact number for the parent, to the office before school begins. A dismissal slip will be issued to the student after the parent has been contacted and the early dismissal has been verified. To preserve the integrity of the classroom environment, early dismissals will end at 2:15pm at the HS, 2:30pm at the MS and 3:00pm at the ES. Please schedule appointments accordingly and be mindful that students will not be dismissed after these times.
